Internet and the individuals; problems and possible law solutions

In our days, the Internet and the general progress of technology has made possible the use of various forms of global communication. The e-mail, the Web pages, on-line shopping, and virtual chat are all ways in which the Internet user can not only interact with machines, but communicate with other persons online. We know that the benefits electronic communication are many because off its rapidity and universality, but there are severe drawbacks; the risk is the potential to reveal personal information about the user. Every time we communicate by electronic media, the risk exists that someone else is compiling or recording personal information for an unwanted use. There is a general consensus that Internet privacy standards are unsafe. The lack of information safeguards can fall into one of two areas: security or confidentiality.
